Letter from the Committee July 2024




Dear Reader,

Gail Godfrey - Supper Coordinator

Gail grew up in rural suburbs on the outskirts of Brisbane and later enjoyed life on cattle properties her family owned around Surat. Entranced by the beauty of music at the tender age of 5, Gail was enrolled in classical piano and ballet lessons. By age 16, she played piano and organ professionally in restaurants, at wedding receptions and corporate functions.

Four years later, Gail was living in Europe and began her piano teaching career in Belgium. On return to Australia, Godfrey's Academy of Music opened on Brisbane's south-side. This purpose-built music academy, which employed 12 staff, was recognised as an outstanding business achiever.

Gail embraced the Kodály philosophy in music education which opened doors into early childhood music education and primary school teaching. She is also a past president of the Kodaly Music Education Institute of Australia and National coordinator for do-re-mi early childhood music teachers.

In 2019 Gail received the International Katalin Forrai Award for her work and contribution to early childhood music education in Australia and overseas. This year Gail was voted in the top 10 piano teachers in Australia for the Yamaha Piano Teacher Award.

The work of C.G. Jung re-surfaced through her post-graduate studies in the Bonny Method of Guided Imagery and Music (GIM) at Melbourne University. Gail has served on the C.G Jung Society of Queensland Committee since 2018.

Her qualifications include Teacher of Music (piano), Bachelor of Human Services, Bachelor Theology, Master of Education and Registered Guided Imagery and Music Therapist and Fellow of the Association for Music and Imagery.

Tributes to immediate past President Kerry Petherbridge

From Pam Blamey, former Society Committee Member:

I first met Kerry at the Ground/Passage: Into the Nooks and Beyond workshop with Sharon Jewell at the Theosophical Society in October 2016.

Kerry Petherbridge was persuaded (a bit like the Speaker of the Parliament) to take up the role of President in 2018, a post she held for six years until 2024. Much water flowed under the bridge in that time, and Kerry's letters on the website give an indication of how tumultuous those early pre-Covid years were.



In May 2018, the Society held a Visioning/Planning Day at Quakers. We had been meeting at the Quakers Meeting House in Kelvin Grove for many years, but our numbers were now such that we outgrew this venue and needed a bigger space. Thus, in 2019, after inspecting six venues within a short radius of the CBD, Kerry and I chose St Mary's Hall, Kangaroo Point.

The Covid 19 pandemic struck Australia around March 2020 and we all remember the lockdowns. State borders opened again in July 2020, but there were short sharp lockdowns from January through to August 2021. It was a very difficult and confusing time. Our attendance numbers dwindled, and Committee members fell away for various life reasons, but Kerry (with the help of Gail and Marty) held the fort steadfastly, keeping members up to date and offering online links by email.



Then came the floods of March 2022; roads were closed, workshops and meetings were postponed with much juggling of dates and venues. "Ah, this mysterious life and its Ways..." Kerry said in an email to me.

A highlight of Kerry's Presidency was her arrangement and coordination of the Jung Society's Fortieth Anniversary Dinner - held in St Mary's Hall on Friday November 4th, 2022. What a night that was! Kerry did an amazing job bringing it all together; the musicians were great, although the caterers were regrettably delayed, the food was lovely, and the speeches were great. It was wonderful to have Miffi, daughter of the Jung Society of Queensland founder Inta McKinn there too and hear her stories of the beginning years in the early 1980s. Marie Makinson's table installations from her Sandplay collection were magical, and I loved the mythological game we played; the MC was very funny! And Lisa's cake was magnificent and delicious.

Kerry has well and truly earned a rest from her labours of love, handing over to a younger enthusiastic committee who will, no doubt, keep the Jung Society going for many more years.

From Anne di Lauro, former Committee member and former President:

Kerry's period as President of the C.G. Jung Society was marked by the devotion that she showed to creating a container for the idea of the Society – a sort of alchemical crucible. This she did by the soulful way that she curated our events, the way she maintained communication between events, especially during the difficult Covid years, and through her writings in the Newsletter. Each President puts their own stamp on the Society and Kerry's mark reflected her own soulfulness and personal vision.

From Marie Makinson, President from 2014 – 2018:

A while ago at the 40th birthday celebration for the society, an event that has lingered with members old and new, I gave a little talk to honour Kerry; to express appreciation for the care, the heart and the soul that she has given over the years of her presidency. I suspect that many who have worn the mantle of the president would admit that it is no easy task, especially for personalities that are drawn to the Jungian way. It is a service in dedication to the 'symbolic life' and I said in my talk that it seems to me that Kerry, in particular, embodies 'the symbolic life'. 'Collected Works: Volume 18' is called 'The Symbolic Life'. The title comes from a lecture that Jung gave for the London based 'Guild of Pastoral Psychology' in 1939 shortly before England was drawn into the second world war. This labyrinthine book contains 60 years of Jung's circumambulation of 'the symbol,' which of course is a totally paradoxical exercise, even so 'the symbol' is the central idea in Jungian psychology, the meaning of which is a kind of 'Holy Grail' that each on the path must find for themselves. However, it is clear that we engage in 'the symbolic life' poetically. We feel its closeness in synchronicities, remember it in stories, myths and in the observance of the religious life. We are deepened in it, through ritual and authentic connection, celebrate it, dancing, singing and playing music, in all of the image making arts. We care for it, in attending to our dreams and listening in deep connection to nature. We treasure it, in appreciation of things made by human hands, in aliveness of culture, connection to the wisdom of animals and country, in the honouring of trees and mountains, in the sacred rituals of ecstasy and foolery and faithfulness to the moral Self.

So much, and so much more, and yet so easily lost. Kerry lives her life in this richness of soul and symbol. She shared so much and kept the society connected to the symbolic life through her extraordinary gift with words, through her unique way of seeing the world, through her researches into all things Jungian and the tremendous effort she made to create a soulful home for the society.

This extract from one of Kerry's letters to the society illustrates beautifully what I am trying to say:

Several years ago I found a white thornless climbing rose in the plant nursery where I sometimes went, bending public health orders in the pandemic period, understanding the deep origins of health very differently from those in administrative quarters. Finding this was a surprise act of renewal at the time, and also of defiance of the climate it would live in and my aberrant gardening care. I later discovered this to be exactly the kind of rose which grew for St Francis of Assisi and there was a sense of 'fatedness' about it. It grew quite lanky and brown-leaved, suffering the salty winds of its place; a survivor without ever having had a single bloom.

So I wanted to see what Assisi said to me, the original place. I wanted to meet the presence of the animal-loving saint in the places holding it there. During these last three closeted and fraught years, the absence of animals around me daily has become very noticeable and also a call from my early years for their warm-bodied instinctual natures.

With relief and gratitude, we soon found that Kerry's lengthy volunteer experience with other organisations had prepared her well for the administrative duties of the Presidency, and her creative and expansive energy served us through the many challenges the Society has faced over the years.



While reading Kerry's volumes of writings over the years of her presidency, I became aware of her unique capacity to draw the reader into her messages with her choice of words. The breadth of her vocabulary is engaging, fun, and soulful. She often made reference to the mysteries of "The Way" as related to the resolution of opposites within the Self. I am reminded of a core of being that has always been present, yet from which I am so easily distracted. It is, for me, Resonant. The Oxford English Dictionary defines resonant as "having the ability to evoke enduring images, memories, or emotions". Kerry's words, and my long involvement with the members and attendees of the Jung Society, have provided a stream of consciousness that reminds me of the journey of the Soul. For that, and for your friendship, thank you, Kerry.

Presentation: Spiritual Individuation: Four Levels of Consciousness in the Gospel of Mary Magdalene and the Egyptian Mysteries of Isis

In this talk, Dr Joanna Kujawa, will discuss four levels of consciousness in The Gospel of Mary Magdalene and their connection with the Mysteries of Isis in ancient Egypt which she believes are examples of spiritual individuation.

In his two essays on Analytical Psychology, Carl Jung defined individuation as a process though which we bring together all our parts. The process of individuation results in creating and embracing the 'incompatible uniqueness' of our' 'in-dividual' self which for him was always of spiritual nature and the final point in the development of human psyche.

Jung was also immensely interested in the Gnostic Gospels and Gnostic ideas which helped him to shape his views on religion and dogma. The Gospel of Mary Magdalene was found in Egypt and, as Dr Joanna argues, have strong traces of older Egyptian rituals associated with the mysteries of Goddess Isis.

Presenter | Dr Joanna Kujawa

Dr Joanna Kujawa is the author of The Other Goddess: Mary Magdalene and the Goddesses of Eros of Secret Knowledge, scholar, and spiritual detective. She received her BA and MA from the Pontifical Institute for Medieval Studies at the University of Toronto, Canada, and her PhD from Monash University, Melbourne, Australia. As an active academic for over 20 years, she uses her scholarly training to investigate topics other academics often pass over, such as: Can spirituality and sexuality be experienced as one? Who was the real Mary Magdalene? Is there a lineage of Goddesses now resurfacing in our collective experience of spirituality?




Apart from her writings for academic publications on spiritual travel, Joanna has also had her short stories and essays published through various media and in many prestigious anthologies, including Best Australian Stories, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, She Rises and Rebelle Society. Individuation is ongoing for us all. Sometimes we have unrecognised complexes in our shadow. Sometimes they are recognised, but we don't know how to integrate them. In this presentation, Dr Toula describes her own individuation journey leading to the creation of Story Image Therapy (SIT®) and its psychospiritual adjunct, SIT Shadow Work™. She will describe her stages in the process, including the recognition, embrace and ultimate integration of complexes in her adolescent shadow that caused her pain as an adult. She's emerged more resilient than before, and now wishes to teach others what she has learned through her sojourn travels through 'the dark night of the soul'.

When there's an ego death, projections are pulled back. There is a unification between our thinking and feeling functions, and an alchemical process begins. Dr Toula's individuation journey is the subject of her recently published book, The Rise of Jung in Me. In it, she outlines not just her own SIT Shadow Work™ voyage, but she also offers six case studies of young people whose lives were transformed through the practical application of SIT Shadow Work™.

Presenter | Dr Toula Gordillo

Dr Toula is a practicing Clinical and Jungian psychologist. She's also a former teacher, specialist Guidance Officer, Intensive Behaviour Support, and Head of Student Services in some of Queensland's largest high schools. Triggered at age 38 by events in her employment, her unconscious hero/heroine's journey to Self-commenced. It was not until age 48, however, when she re-experienced familiar feelings (complexes in her adolescent shadow) that her conscious journey inward began in earnest.



As her individuation progressed, she started using Story Image Therapy (SIT®) to heal her complexes. Among other methods, she began journaling. The Rise of Jung in Me is the outcome of her journaling process... what she now calls first-person Jungian action research.

Healthy and benign altruism is the ability to experience sustained and relatively conflict-free pleasure from contributing to the welfare of others. Malignant altruism involves the compulsion to prioritise other's needs. This form of helping tends to be reinforced by others and society. A long term pattern of such selfsacrifice leads to compassion fatigue, self-estrangement and depression. In clinical practice, many individuals present with a pattern of malignant altruism including in those presenting with relationship issues and a loss of meaning and connection with their deeper selves. Malignant altruism has been linked to an inability to mourn a lack of attunement of the caregiver in early life and describes the persona that develops in defense of this loss. In this case-based presentation, I will discuss the unique analytic work required for individuals who have developed malignant altruism as a persona. The process of moving malignant altruism to benign altruism will involve a reconnection with the Self, learning how to tolerate vulnerability, conscious grieving and the development of a new way of being with others. For those with extreme malignant altruism, this work will feel catastrophic and a strong analytic container, that can eventually be introjected, will be essential for success. A weakening of the malignant attachment and a strengthening of the individual's ability to be contained, will serve to loosen the pathological self-care system and facilitate an interpersonal and intrapsychic connection which will enable the focus on repair.

In Fundamental Questions of Psychotherapy, Jung (1966) emphasizes how the analytical encounter is a dialectical process, par excellence, in which the analyst participates as much as the client. Jung believes that the client can only gain his inner security after experiencing the security of the relationship with his analyst as a human being (ibid, 1966). The therapeutic relationship thus requires a great deal of involvement and the therapist's countertransference is an important and creative element in assisting this process. This involvement will inevitably lead both analyst and client to be infected by each other's unconscious material. As Jung points out:

The psychotherapist... should clearly understand that psychic infections... are in fact the concomitants of his work, and thus fully in accord with the instinctive disposition of his own life. This realization also gives him the right attitude to his patient. The patient then means something to him personally, and this provides the most favourable basis for treatment. (Jung 1966, paras. 364-5)

This presentation will discuss the archetype of the wounded healer and will invite us to take a deeper look into one's relationship while caring for others in the analytical setting. Marie-Louise Von Franz believes that the wounded healer is THE archetype of the Self and is the core of all genuine healing procedures. Only when the polarities of the archetype are integrated in both analyst and client true healing is possible. This presentation will draw upon literature review on the wounded healer and some clinical material to illustrate the importance for the analyst (or any other care professional) to confront and acknowledge his /her own vulnerabilities , projections and his/her relationship to power to then question his/her true motivations in chosing to be a care professional.

He is currently a candidate in training as a Jungian Analyst with the Australia New Zealand Society of Jungian Analysts (ANZSJA). 


