Letter from the Committee January 2025

Dear Reader,

If you come along to the presentation nights you'll see a table set up with flowers, candles and the Red Book open to a beautifully illuminated page. Lisa, our Treasurer, made a thoughtful comment one evening that the room wouldn't feel right if the Red Book wasn't set out. Taking her cue I made sure to always bring Liber Nova, I brought flowers and added candles to make it a focal energy of holding place for the Society's pop-up presentations. Not having a permanent place of our own, it's important to bring in the spirit of the Society as much as possible and the Red Book table became the first site for this process.

After about a year of supporting on the committee, I felt a growing need to give expression to a communal image that had begun to shape itself. Water always figured in the images. The ToadPond was the first manifestation of this, which was based on both Jung's waterworks and Marie-Louise von Franz's toad pond that she dug out at her own tower in Bollingen, Switzerland. The filmed interview of Marie-Louise von Franz, by Dr Suzanne Wagner from the C.G. Jung Institute of Los Angeles 1977, tells of Jung turning to her while she watched him playing, making little springs and channels in the lakeside at his tower in Bollingen, and saying, "You know, only today I have suddenly thought on what I am doing when I am playing like that. That's what I have done my whole life digging out springs."

I recalled all the Jung institutes, societies and clubs over these many decades that have continued to dig out springs and channel the water of the soul for those who are drawn to Jung's work. I thought about how so many have added their talents and time to tending and developing the work begun by Jung in the many places around the world. I saw that we here in Queensland, so very far away from Switzerland, were also digging out our own spring, offering that water to all who were looking for refreshment. The Society was like a well and we were the caretakers. As a committee it was our turn to tend the well, making a place for folks to be welcomed, refreshed and enlivened by the waters of the soul that Jung, and his fellows who have come after him, knew to be so precious.

A well of wellness, a healing spring, a place to share with others who have intuited Jung's work as a valuable and needed presence, was what we on the committee were devoting our time to. I welcome you all to come and drink deeply.




So what about the Toad Pond gatherings in 2025?



From the Treasurer

Dear Reader,

At the AGM in March 2024 a new Committee came together and slowly over the months drew together a vision for the Society. It takes time to form relationships, understand working styles, accommodate time constraints (we all have full lives outside the Society), and for a unified vision to coalesce out of these disparate parts. We have formed solid working relationships based on being willing to understand each other and to work with the ebb and flow of our humanness.

The work of not only maintaining but growing the Society requires physical and psychological energy, and then a hefty amount of spirit as well. At the beginning of 2024 the Society was, and still is, recovering from all that COVID and subsequent lockdowns wrought upon us. The primary impact was of course an impact on Membership, but constant lockdowns also created a shift in how people connected, with digital offerings becoming the norm as well as providers with tantalising options from around the globe entering the mix. You may be aware that both the Melbourne and Sydney Jung Societies now offer their presentations via digital means only.

So, in this environment the Committee has been working hard to rejuvenate the hive of the Society. Our unified vision for the Society? It is one of a warm and welcoming space, where new and regular attendees will feel welcomed. Where face-to-face events are prioritised and digital options are available for those who prefer them. We are crafting a container where Jung's philosophies and theories can be shared and discovered in an environment that is not elitist, because it's understood that people come to Jung from many different paths. We will continue to focus on face-to-face offerings including monthly Thursday evening Presentations, more regular Saturday Workshops, The Toad Pond which is an informal gathering held at GOMA Cafe and hosted by Florence Forrest (our Librarian), and the introduction of Lily Pad gatherings which will be ad hoc activities on some Saturdays. While our focus is to develop and enhance the face-to-face aspects of the Society, we will be offering the monthly presentations via Zoom where and when possible.

This growth has not been without growing pains, and our audiovisual 'kit' has needed updating to ensure a quality digital experience. And while we're not looking at moving from St Mary's any time soon, we do receive feedback about the poor acoustics of the Church Hall. Although the parking, kitchen, and view are fabulous! Additionally, the cost of insurance, necessary subscriptions, and supper provisions have increased significantly over the years. The Society also pays its presenters, and for those who travel to give a presentation, the Society often pays travel costs, and/or accommodation. As Queensland does not have the range of speaker options available in more densely populated states and cities, this latter is the price of providing quality presentations or workshops.

It may surprise you to know that there hasn't been a fee increase for Membership, Presentations or Workshops since at least 2015. For this Committee, or any Committee moving forward, to continue to bring quality offerings to the Society a fee increase is necessary.

If pollen is the food that feeds the hive, and for our Jung Society hive to thrive, we invite supporters of the Society to bring their pollen in the form of Membership, Membership renewal, and active participation in the programme. Jung referred to money as 'libido' and 'coined energy'. That of itself it is banal, but symbolically it is a form of energy. As pollen feeds and nourishes the hive, your financial offerings will allow the Society to not only be sustainable, but to grow.



SoulCollage[®] was developed by the late Seena B. Frost, a long-time psychotherapy clinician and practitioner based in California. Over time and through her practice, she brought together influences from various sources including C.G. Jung, to create a methodology used around the world today.

In this playshop Lisa will be introducing us to SoulCollage[®] and guiding us through the process of making and interpreting our own SoulCollage[®] cards. No artistic skill required. Lisa writes:

"Using magazine images, glue, scissors and cardboard, SoulCollage[®] is deceptively simple, yet the insights and gifts that SoulCollage[®] facilitate are a constant surprise. As you craft each card with care and attention, your relationship with yourself, your community, and the internal and external archetypal energies that influence you are strengthened."

The session will cover:

- Card Making: how to choose images using your intuition.
- Journalling with your cards: discover the 'voice' of the card and its inherent gifts for you.
- Shadow: Witnessing shadow and finding the gold within.
- The Four Suits and Transpersonal Cards: explore how your inner personality parts, internal energy guides, external sentient beings (community), and external archetypal influences, are symbolised.
- **Building Community:** the community within you, and those who draw together for the day, embracing and celebrating our diversity.

All products of the human imagination have an archetypal basis, including the most sublime art, ingenious ideas, and political and social movements. Yet there is a great deal of popular misunderstanding about archetypes, which misses the nuance and specificity of Jung's understanding.

This lecture provides an engaging orientation to this core concept for newcomers, while those experienced in Jungian psychology will be inspired and validated by the discussion and contemporary applications of archetypal theory which is not part of our everyday discourse.

We'll learn about archetypes as structuring patterns of the psyche, related to complexes, that influence our ways of perceiving and responding to the world. We will consider different metaphors for understanding archetypes as universal patterns of human experience. We'll also look at archetypes in terms of fields or networks that are constellated around or exist between people, and structure our systems of relations (such as the Orphan archetype in Australia).

Attention will be paid to archetypal patterns which are dominant and re-emerging in the collective today, and how we may respond to these more consciously and constructively. There will be opportunity for personal reflection and discussion. A further reading list will be provided.

Presenter | Dr Suzanne Cremen

Dr Suzanne Cremen is the founder of the Life Artistry Centre (www.lifeartistry.com.au), where since 2005 on Jinibara country (Sunshine Coast hinterland) and Wurundjeri country (Melbourne) she has taught, consulted, and hosted much-loved graduate level courses and retreats facilitating the creative applications of depth psychology. She is the author of From Career to Calling: A depth psychology guide to soul-making work in darkening times (Routledge 2020), a finalist in the Australian Career Book Awards supported by the Royal Society of Arts. Suzanne holds a PhD from La Trobe, two Masters degrees from Pacifica Graduate Institute, USA (Jungian and Archetypal Studies; Engaged Humanities and Mythological Studies) as well as degrees in Law and Arts (UNSW).



For five years Dr Cremen served on the faculty of the Pacifica Graduate Institute teaching a course on the depth psychology of vocation. Her Jungian-oriented research – on topics from personality type, to art and nature, to Argentine tango – is published in international and peer-reviewed journals. She has chaired symposia and spoken on the applications of archetypal psychology at major international conferences, including in New York, Canada and Australia. Suzanne is a past president and honorary life member of the CG Jung Society of Queensland, and an advocate for the therapeutic power of the arts and the archetypal imagination in transforming and healing the cultural psyche and our relationships with the natural world. The word redemption should not be associated with the Christian dogma and theology, where it is a concept with so many connotations. In fairytales, redemption refers specifically to a condition where someone has been cursed or bewitched and through certain happenings or events in the story is redeemed. ... A human being in a neurotic state might very well be compared to a bewitched person ...

Marie-Louise von Franz "The Psychological Meaning of Redemption Motifs in Fairy Tales"

Much darker than the Disney version, Carlo Collodi's original 19th century tale "The Adventures of Pinocchio" is rich with archetypal themes similar to those found in ancient myths and fairy tales. In particular it exemplifies aspects of the Puer archetype and reflects the journey of individuation that can be understood through the lens of Joseph Campbell's "Hero's Journey". The motif of Redemption is centred on the search for the Father and service to the Feminine.

The novel "The Golden Ass" by Apuleius, written in Latin in the second century AD, also illustrates the motif of Redemption. A young adventurer Lucius is liberated from his ass's body when he pays proper respect to the Feminine in the guise of the goddess Isis.

We will explore both these stories and use them as a way of illustrating the psychological meanings of redemption.

Australian by birth, Anne obtained a BA from the University of Queensland and a Post-graduate Diploma of Librarianship from the University of NSW. After a period working at the State Library of Queensland, she sailed away to see the world. April Presentation

Exploring the Many Faces of Coincidence

Presented by Prof Laurence Browne



Just as planets and stars appear as points of light in the night sky and are indistinguishable to the untrained eye, so coincidences may seem on the surface to be all of one kind. This, unfortunately, has led to a tendency towards either/or explanations to account for them. For example, there are some who favour a statistical approach to coincidences and tend to analyse them using probability theory. In contrast, there are others who are particularly interested in the potential meaning to be found in coincidences and what this might imply for the nature of existence. The aim of this talk is to present a comprehensive and inclusive approach to coincidences that explores the different ways they can be understood.

In my book The Many Faces of Coincidence I have suggested a basic fourfold categorisation of coincidences of all types. These are: a) random chance; b) natural causality; c) supernatural causality; d) synchronicity. Just to clarify: "supernatural causality'would include both the idea of fate and the attraction of affinities as well as 'paranormal' explanations such as genuine premonitions or telepathy; 'synchronicity' refers to C.G. Jung's term for meaningful coincidences, and he described it as "...a certain curious principle... [which] takes the coincidence of events in space and time as meaning something more than mere chance..." ¹

It is likely that much of the current interest in coincidences is a result of Jung's writings on the subject, and in particular his coining of the term synchronicity for meaningful coincidences. From a reading of the literature surrounding Jung's development of the synchronicity hypothesis, there appear to be three key ingredients in a synchronistic occurrence that distinguishes it from a chance coincidence.² These are: 1) an equivalence of meaning between an external event and deep psychological processes in the individual involved;

2) an accompanying feeling of numinosity experienced as an emotional charge;
3) a flash of total insight or, as Jung called it, 'absolute knowledge'. He called it this, according to his associate Marie-Louise von Franz, because he wanted to emphasise how this form of sudden and immediate knowing "differs completely from our conscious knowledge." ³

This form of knowing runs deeper than discursive thought, and in an interview with Mircea Eliade in 1952 Jung explained synchronicity as a rupture of time which "closely resembles numinous experiences in which space, time and causality are abolished." ⁴ As for the meaning in meaningful coincidences, the following quote by von Franz is well worth including here:

The realisation of 'meaning' is... not a simple acquisition of information or of knowledge, but a living experience that touches the heart just as much as the mind. It seems to us to be an illumination characterised by great clarity as well as something ineffable – a lightning flash... a 'quantum leap' in the psyche.⁵




May Presentation
